In 1993, the Library of Virginia established the **Virginia Newspaper Project (VNP)** with a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and in partnership with the Library of Congress. Ever since, the VNP has worked to locate, describe, inventory, preserve, and provide public access to historical Virginia newspapers housed not only at the Library of Virginia but throughout the commonwealth.

The Library of Virginia offers access to a wide array of resources for researching newspapers from its broad collection of over 4,200 titles, in original ink press copy, on microfilm, and in digital format through the Library's web-based repository, Virginia Chronicle (www.virginiachronicle.com). There are currently 1,273,000 pages available on Virginia Chronicle, with new content added regularly.

The illustrations, advertisements, editorial cartoons, and comics that make up these coloring pages are from newspapers published throughout Virginia, from Alexandria to Wytheville, and exemplify the impressive graphic art and design commonly found in newspapers of the late-19th to mid-20th century. All of the images are from newspapers available on Virginia Chronicle.

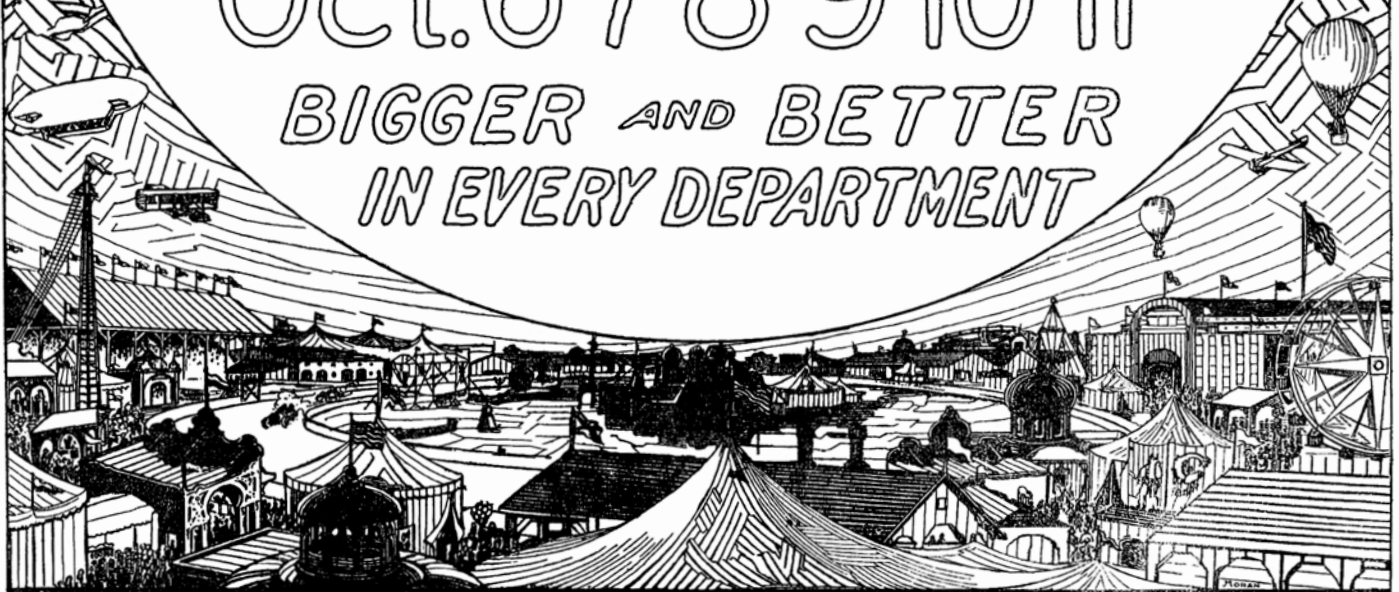

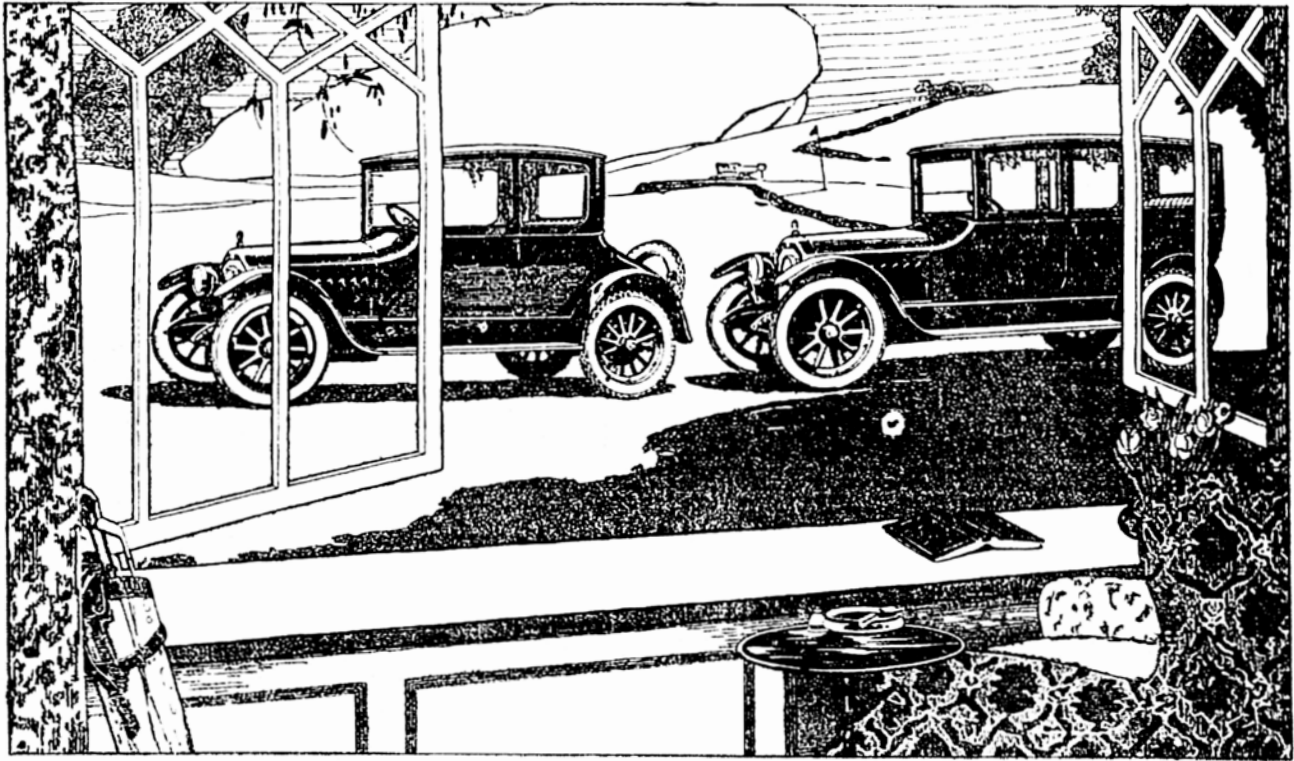

She'd Rather Dance Than Be a Duchess.

Latest Romance of Mlle. Trouhanowa of the Ballet That Bakst Made Famous

A ROMANCE even more remarkable than any of the recent alliances between the stage and the peerage is now agitating British high society.

The young Duke of Leinster, the head of one of the most illustrious families in the United Kingdom, is said to be madly in love with the statuesque Russian dancer, Mlle. Trouhanowa. The young man is one of the only two unmarried dukes in the Kingdom and decidedly the most eligible of all British bachelors. He is twenty-six years old and good looking. For over a thousand years his family—the FitzGeralds—have been famous. The most high born dowagers in the country have been working strenuously and in vain to secure him for one of their daughters.

Now to find him devoted to a Russian dancer infuriates them. The Duke's third brother, Lord Edward FitzGerald, recently married May Ribblesdale, the pretty pink pajama girl of the Gaiety Theatre. That was trying enough to the dowagers, but nothing compared to the enthrallment of the reigning Duke.

The young Duke is ensconced of physical perfection. Mlle. Trouhanowa is not strictly beautiful, but she has a superb body overflowing with health, strength and vitality. She was developed by the wonderful regime of the Russian Imperial Ballet College, which raises dancing to the rank of the highest art.

She is understood to be the original of the most brilliant of the new drawings of dancers made by Leon Bakst, the famous Russian artist, whose art has combined with that of his dancing compatriots in the Russian artistic invasion of civilization.

One of these drawings appears on this page, having been drawn exclusively for this newspaper by the great Bakst himself.

The Duke says that she alone of all women is fit to be Duchess of Leinster. Her abounding vitality, he feels, would restore the blood of the FitzGeralds, somewhat dulled by the matrimonial mishaps of a thousand years.

But the Duke's desire to make the dancer a duchess is not the most remarkable feature of this romance. The dancer refuses to be a duchess unless she can continue to dance. Mlle. Trouhanowa is noted for her sinuosity. When Richard Strauss suggested that she should dance in a certain way in his "Salome," because the Kaiser wished it, she replied:

"Who is the Kaiser, any way? What does he know about dancing?"

So now she declines to give up her beloved art for a dukedom. The ineffectual Duke hesitates to maintain a duchess on the stage. He wishes her to preside over his ancestral estates and fill them with a splendid race of new FitzGeralds. He is cruelly torn by conflicting emotions, and he may fall at any moment.

VIEW OF BROAD STREET, WITH THE CARNIVAL IN PROGRESS—LOOKING EAST FROM JEFFERSON STREET.



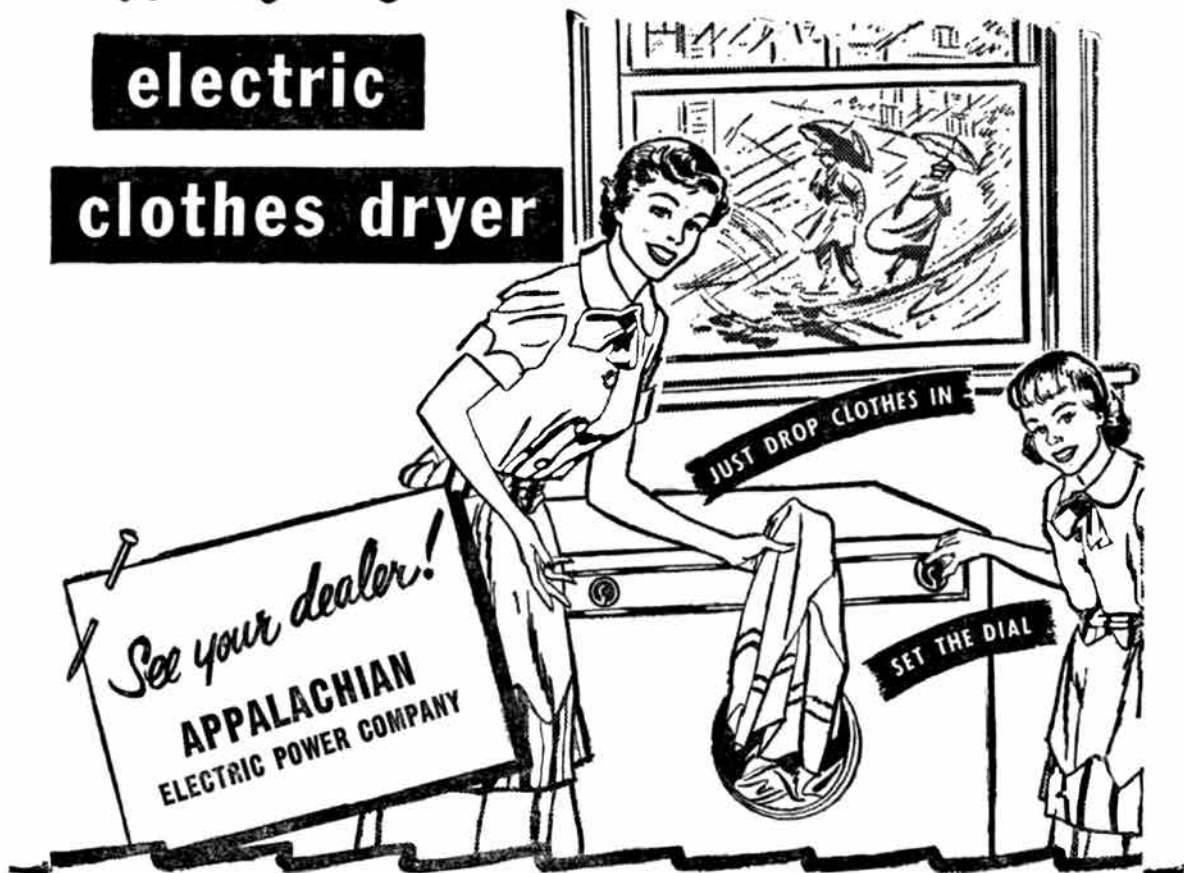
