




The Bulfinch Building, numbered 1 on this picture, was the original hospital and at the time of completion was considered the "handsomest" edifice in the state. It was designed by Charles Bulfinch, the architect of the State Capitol Building. In and around this building has been written the history of the medical service of one of America's first and greatest hospitals, a service that has measured progress during the most productive epoch of medical science in human history.

When the Bulfinch Building was opened in September, 1821, it was equipped

with 64 beds. Today the total number of hospital beds is 520, of which 410 are in the wards, and 110 in Phillips House, built for the accommodation of private patients.

This birdseye picture shows the number of buildings and the grounds of the Massachusetts General Hospital. With the exception of the Eye and Ear Infirmary, numbered 10 on the picture, the hospital today occupies the entire block bounded by Charles, Fruit, Allen and Blossom Streets, about 10 acres. Across from the Moseley Building on Fruit Street is the Nurses' Home.


