

"Blackbeard the Pirate" engraving from A General History of the Pyrates by "Captain Charles Johnson." London, 1724.




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
Etching by Jacques Callot, "The Chariots" and "The Characters," from *Guerra d' amore* (War of love) Florence, 1615.

De Furtivis Literarum (On secret letters) by Giambattista della Porta, Naples, 1563.


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"Alphabets des insects," a French alphabet book published in 1883, deploys a cast of bookish insects to teach children how to read.


